



REPORT FOR A MEDICAL OUTREACH CONDUCTED AT KANJUL COMMUNITY ON MAY 16, 2025.

Introduction

On 16th May 2025, Mugie Conservancy in partnership with Moyo Foundation and other stakeholders, organized a medical outreach at Kanjul Primary School. The camp provided free healthcare services including patient consultations, triage and vital signs assessment, medical advice and on-site dispensing of prescribed medications. The team addressed common illnesses, conducted health screenings and offered referrals for advanced care, while also delivering public health education to promote long-term community wellness.

Highlights

1. Patient Attendance

- A total of 284 community members from Kanjul accessed comprehensive healthcare services during the outreach (118 males and 166 females), addressing a range of medical, nutritional and preventive health needs.

2. <u>Tuberculosis Screening</u>

- 27 individuals exhibiting clinical symptoms consistent with tuberculosis (including persistent cough, unintentional weight loss and night sweats) were identified during the outreach. In collaboration with Mouwarak Health Centre, sputum samples were collected for each suspected case and prepared for transport to Rumuruti Sub-County Hospital for GeneXpert MTB/RIF testing. Contact tracing information was recorded for each individual, with plans for follow-up testing of close contacts pending diagnostic confirmation.

3. Antenatal Care for Expectant Mothers

- 19 expectant mothers received comprehensive antenatal care (ANC) services, which included focused obstetric history-taking, blood pressure monitoring, screenings and individualized nutritional counseling. Mothers were counseled on the benefits of skilled birth attendance and the importance of delivering at a health facility to minimize maternal and neonatal complications. They were strongly encouraged to initiate or maintain regular ANC visits at local clinics for ongoing monitoring and support.





4. Community Awareness

- Small-group health-education sessions covered evidence-based prevention of respiratory infections (e.g., pneumonia, TB) and gastrointestinal illnesses (e.g., acute diarrheal disease), emphasizing hand hygiene, cough etiquette, safe water practices, nutritional support and age-appropriate immunizations.






Above 5 years: 171 were seen over the age of 5 years. Below is a pie chart that gives a picture of what was managed.
